

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

his own emergency was able to show Barrick the correct location to apply the pressure to dislodge the obstruction.

This past summer, Day Treatment Team Leader/Case Manager Lawrence Williams also put first aid skills he learned to use. While on vacation in South Carolina, people started asking for help for a small girl on the beach who was not breathing. Lawrence performed rescue breaths and finger chest compressions until she began breathing again and was assisted by beach patrol. When asked about this incident, Lawrence humbly said, "I personally do not feel like I did anything special, just something that we've been trained to do when needed."

That ability to help people be prepared, trained and ready to react for emergency situations is very important. Last year River Rock Academy began a CPR and First Aid Training Program for students. Each River Rock Campus now has a Certified Staff Trainer who works with students to train and certify them on these valuable life-saving skills. Fifty one students have completed the program this school year and many more will be instructed and certified in the months to come.

Guest Speaker Encourages Students

Steve Mason recently visited multiple River Rock Campus locations to bring awareness to the topic of suicide prevention and share valuable lessons he learned from his circumstances. Now a healthy and successful actor, stuntman and producer, Mason strives to start open conversations with the goal of helping others deal with their struggles in a healthy way.

As a child, Mason lived in troubled home environment. He found his father, who died by suicide, at the age of eight which had a lasting impact on his life. For many years, Mason bottled up his feelings and lived a life of negative choices and substance abuse that eventually lead to his near death by overdose.

In time, Mason learned that not dealing with his unresolved past lead to his unhealthy lifestyle. By being honest and vulnerable, he hopes to help people communicate better and learn to process their emotions instead of burying them. “Not talking about substance abuse, suicide and mental health problems are not going to make these things go away,” shared Mason. “Don’t be an island of one. Talk to people and when you struggle with anger or depression, don’t let your emotions make your decisions for you.”

Mason shared the importance of growing stronger from past struggles and mistakes. He illustrated his point by sharing the story of how a butterfly develops its wings by breaking through its cocoon. Without the struggle that makes the wings strong, the butterfly would never fly. With that lesson, Mason encouraged students to learn from their past circumstances, take advantage of second chances and start thinking about what they want in life. “You don’t have to know what all the answers are, but you do need to recognize what the answers are not. Recognizing the ability to learn from mistakes is what is important.”



Unity Day



Life of Opportunities

Why would someone travel 2073 miles to share his story and inspire students at River Rock Academy? Because Judge Andrew Valdez, the first Hispanic Juvenile Court Judge in Utah, believes that life is about opportunities and he wants each and every student he encounters to value second chances and the doors that education can open.

Over a three day period in the fall, Judge Valdez traveled to River Rock Campuses in Berks, Cumberland, Lancaster and York County where he explained to students how his world was impacted by the kindness of a stranger when he was a child. Before he arrived, many students had the opportunity to read his book, *No One Makes It Alone*, the true story of Valdez's life and unexpected experiences.

Growing up in poverty surrounded by gangs, Valdez's life took a positive turn when he met a man named Jack Keller. He showed streetwise Valdez that there are better ways than gang life to face adversity and take responsibility. Keller introduced Valdez to the game of tennis and stressed the importance of his education as well as the values of honesty, respect and hard work. "For me, tennis opened up doors and made me realize problems can't be solved with violence. It can be art, music or whatever you want. If you want your world to get bigger you need to value education," said Valdez.

The acts of kindness extended to Valdez came full circle when four decades later he came upon Keller in a convenience store, alone in life and suffering from Alzheimer's disease. Keller was taken in by Valdez who made sure his childhood mentor was cared for during the remaining years of his life.

Valdez told students he recognized that they have made mistakes but encouraged them to take advantage of the opportunities they have now. He shared, "By being in this program you have people who are your Jack Keller's in life. They care about you and you matter. Open your heart and mind and ask yourself if you want things in your life to get better or worse. Don't miss this opportunity."
